HELP FROM CITIZENS ADVICE

Q. - I was talking to my mum about the cost of TV licences the other day, and she said she had not bought one for a long time because it was too expensive. Will she get into trouble if she gets caught?

A. - Yes, everyone who watches, records or downloads live TV, or BBC iPlayer, on any device (even a phone) must have a TV licence by law. From 1 April 2025, the cost is £174.50 a year. Enforcement officers can carry out checks and visit homes to verify if a licence is needed. If you are caught, you can be prosecuted and fined up to £1,000 plus costs. However, if your mum belongs to certain groups of people, or is struggling financially, there is help available. If she is over 75 and getting Pension Credit, she will receive a free licence. Contact Citizens Advice for help with claiming Pension Credit. Blind or severely sight impaired individuals receive a 50% discount. If your mum is in residential care or sheltered accommodation, there is a concessionary licence of £7.50 – the Care Manager will have information on this.

There is also a Simple Payment Plan, which offers flexible fortnightly or monthly plans to spread the cost of a licence over 12 months. This is only available for specific customers in financial difficulty, but South Lakes Citizens Advice can make referrals. Do encourage your mum to buy a licence or to get help with payments right away, if that is applicable, to avoid a magistrate's court summons.

DALE PARK WEATHER

The dry weather continues. March total 1.69", by far the lowest since my records began, with 22 dry days. April to the 24th 1.91" and 14 dry days.

The yearly total so far is 14.66" and 64 dry days. By contrast 2024 - March 7.53 (6 dry) April 8" (8 dry) and yearly total to that date 35" which makes this year 21" dryer than last year.

CHURCH NEWS

Dear Friends,

John Dixon's very interesting Church News article last month spoke about how the date for Easter is decided. As you know Easter came quite late this year and I'm actually writing this article on Easter Monday with a deadline for the end of the week. With the message of Easter still very much in mind let me say something about hope and also about changed lives.

Hope is at the heart of Easter which is not just a happy ending after the grim story of Jesus' passion and crucifixion, nor should we see it merely as welcome relief after the sombre days of Lent. The resurrection of Jesus from the dead was pivotal moment in history, the start of God's new creation and a fresh beginning. If we take a moment and compare John chapter 20 with the first chapters of John and of Genesis we find a powerful sense of themes being repeated and developed; themes of light and darkness and about having a relationship with God. John 1 speaks of the right of Jesus' followers to become children of God and in John 20 for the first time Jesus describes God as 'your Father' and 'your God'. A new day, a new era, dawned with Jesus' resurrection, twice John tells us that it happened on the first day of the week.

Earlier on, in very human terms and before the crucifixion, the disciple Peter had denied even knowing Jesus and he then wept bitterly for having done so. But that moment of weakness did not need to be the last word and it was not. Following the events around the resurrection Peter was a changed man and he would become a strong leader within the church.

May the message of Easter be an encouragement for you.
