The other essential ingredient was plenty of interested visitors but heavy rainfall, the first in weeks, played its part in keeping numbers low. Nevertheless, formal judging yielded over 25 prize-winners; bragging rights went jointly to Gay Jarvis and Helen Adams who both scored the most points although Pam Priestley should feel proud to have won the 18-strong Chutney class. Tea and cake (generously donated by local people and WI members) was available to visitors from the kitchen, efficiently run by Christine Jackson and helpers. The day had been organised as a fund-raiser for the Reading Room and, despite the modest turnout, about £500 was raised. COLTON PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Tackling storm damage Storm Amy caused localised flooding, fallen trees and branches and surface damage on some lanes. We have reported the issues that we have been made aware of to the Westmorland & Furness Highways Team and hope that the repairs will be carried out soon.

Steps you can take:

- You can report problems, including flooding, potholes, fallen trees and damage to the road surface and by phoning the Council on 0300 373 3300 or using this link https://www.westmorlandandfurness. gov.uk/parking-streets-andtransport/streets-roads-andpavements
- If a drain needs clearing or the verges require work, you can contact the Parish Council and we will assess if the job is something Archie, our Parish Lengthsman, can do. Colton Parish Council has supported new proposals to apply Public Space Protection Orders (PSPOs) to the East side of Coniston Water. Following increasing concerns about anti-social behaviour, we have added our voice to calls for increased powers for the Council and all those involves in visitor management to tackle this growing problem.

CHURCH NEWS

Dear Friends.

All Souls' Day on 2nd November and Remembrance Day on 11th November are almost with us. These are important occasions for many people.

On the battlefield there are those who die and are never identified and The Tomb of the Unknown Warrior helps to mark their loss. The background story of this is remarkable. In 1916 David Railton, an army chaplain serving on the Western Front in Europe, saw a grave marked by a rough cross on which was pencilled "An unknown British soldier". This prompted his suggestion that the body of an unidentified British soldier from the battlefields of France might be buried in Westminster Abbey "among the kings" to represent all those who lost their lives in the First World War fighting for the Empire. Four years later, on November 11 1920, amidst great ceremony and with King George V in attendance, exactly this took place.

In preparation, several bodies were exhumed from the battlefields, brought to a chapel near Arras in France and placed in unmarked coffins. Brigadier Wyatt, his eyes closed, placed his hand on one of the coffins and that was the body chosen. With great ceremony at every stage the coffin was then brought across the channel to Westminster Abbey where it was received by 100 recipients of the Victoria Cross and a group of mourners comprising women each of whom had lost their husbands and each of their sons in the war. The coffin was buried in soil brought from France and to this day the Tomb of the Unknown Warrior is the only one in Westminster Abbey on which no one is allowed to walk.

As we prepare to remember those who have died, whether in warfare or otherwise, let us remember too the words and the tears of Jesus when faced with the death of Lazarus. Embodied there were Christian hope and caring, things which today and every day it is the church's duty and privilege to share with others.

RUSLAND CHURCH TOWER

The Reverend John Dixon, chair of Rusland PCC, opened the meeting in Rusland Reading Room by outlining the history of the tower problem and the steps taken so far.

An excellent, informative and at times amusing talk given by David Wiggins of Clach Conservation left us in no doubt of the state of the tower. He described abseiling down the side of the tower removing quite a lot of sizeable stones which came away in his hands like books from a shelf.

Basically the tower is a stocky stable form. The parapet needs taking down and rebuilding. The next section down, the bell tower, requires work on the wall and louvres. The section below is in relatively good condition. The bottom section including buttresses, which is a poorly built Victorian addition, is the main problem. The major cause of damage is 167 years of weather in an exposed position. To quote David 'we have a big problem on our hands'. David then took questions from the floor and many people had the opportunity to speak to him later.

There was a board showing photos of the tower, a timeline of actions to date and money spent so far.

We are looking at various options following a survey by John Coward Architects As yet, we do not have sufficient information to make a decision which route to take. Clearly any tower repair is likely to be very expensive so we would be dependent on sufficient funds being available via grants, donations and fundraising.

Rusland PCC thank all those (over 50) who attended the meeting and all those who couldn't but expressed their support. Thank you to John for chairing and all those who helped clearing and washing up after the cheese and wine.

Meanwhile the church is still holding services and all welcome via the vestry entrance.
