### COLTON PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

The Parish Council web page on Colton's 'Green Roads' now includes copies of correspondence between the Parish Council, Highways and the National Park on this topic. The Council's request for a temporary TRO (Traffic Regulation Order) on the Nibthwaite-to-Parkamoor track brought a fairly negative response from the Park, who are unwilling to impose one unless Highways have a definite intention to make repairs.

Our County Councillor, Rod Wilson, is lobbying hard in an attempt to get some agreement from Highways for the allocation funds.

At the High Furness Neighbourhood Forum meeting on 12 October, we heard about new private water supply regulations coming into force in December which will mean changes in practice and charging regimes. In particular, householders will be asked to complete risk assessments of their water supplies every 5 years, for which there will be a charge. There was concern at the late notification of these regulations and the lack of information available. We will try to find out more detail and keep you informed.

We are hoping that Elizabeth Bruce, a local sustainable energy consultant, will be coming to speak about suitable green energy initiatives for Colton at our meeting on 7th December at Rusland Reading Room, 7:30pm. All welcome, as ever.

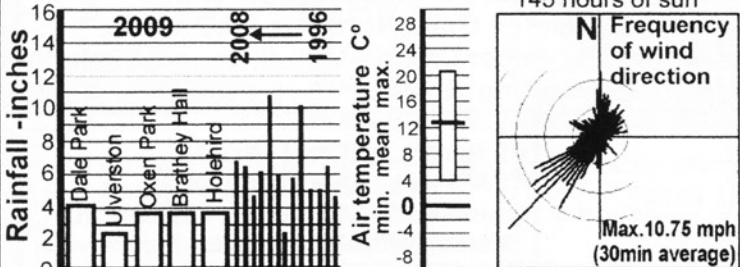

REPORT ON 19<sup>TH</sup> OCTOBER MEETING

The feasibility study for the Hydro Project should be received by the end of October.

At the start of November we will be distributing a questionnaire to every individual who lives or works in the Parish. The questionnaire is vital to enable us to understand the views of the Parish about a variety of topics. The results will then be collated and built into actions for the Parish Plan. The Questionnaire will also be available for completion on line from the Parish website. At the meeting in early October the proposed planning development at Stricely Fell for two extra caravans was considered. The Council voted not to support the application on the basis that none of the reasons for refusal of permission the last time had been addressed.

## CHURCH NEWS

Dear Friends,

As I write this, the Church of England is in the news again. This is rarely a good thing, and the news of the possible departure of some clergy to the Roman Catholic Church, seems to me to be rather sad. It is not that I have anything against the Roman Church; the sadness comes from a sense of what the Church of England might lose.

To coin a cliché, the Church of England has always been a 'broad church'. Indeed, slightly oddly, that phrase- 'broad church'- is used to describe anything with a rich and complicated diversity. My hope and prayer is that it will continue to apply to the Church of England.

A church needs to recognise that God works beyond its narrow boundaries, in mysterious ways beyond our understanding, working in places which are strange and alien to us. Traditionally, the Church of England has been rather good at that- being a broad and diverse church, recognising the value of having members with very different theologies and church traditions. It is rightly both catholic and reformed. My understanding of the Anglican tradition is that it celebrates diversity, enjoys being a body made up of very different parts. One of the important things about Anglican ministry is that it is available for all, no matter what they believe or what they have done with their lives. God has given us wonderful diversity, but human beings have a habit of turning diversity into division. But that ought not to be the Anglican way.

The beauty of Anglicanism is precisely that it is a broad, questioning, church of a forgiving, loving gospel. That is something to be preserved.

### BETTY GALLOWAY 1923 – 2009

Betty arrived in Satterthwaite with husband Arthur and their family in 1954. They moved into Hawkrigg House (which Betty declared to be haunted) and eventually Hill Top. Betty quickly endeared herself to the community as a friend and the very best of neighbours. A lady of many parts, Betty was a founder member of the Deerskin Society, a school dinner lady for 12 years during which she taught the children basic cooking skills and helped them to produce a booklet "Gallop Galloway's Gourmet Dishes", Clerk to Satterthwaite Parish Council for 31 years; and a WI member, also singing in the WI choir. Studies with the Open University were done in her spare time, the Church linen was never so immaculate as when Betty was the laundress and when she finally had to leave the village everyone missed her quietly done, kind deeds, too numerous to mention. Those of us who knew Betty treasure the memory of her on her bike or running to the post box. We all loved and miss her, no one more than Frances, John and Bernie, her six grandchildren, and four great grandchildren.
